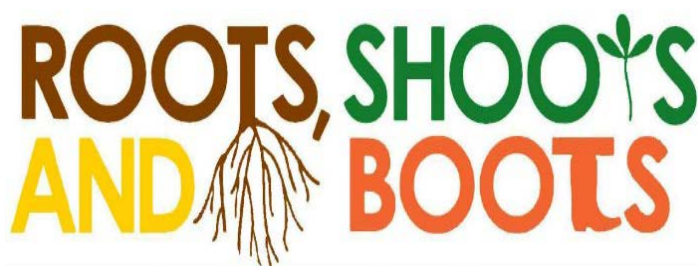
10:30 a.m. Soil Health and Organic Farming: "We all do better when we all do better"

Martens began his farming career as a conventional grower in the 1970s. He and his partner, Mary-Howell, began to transition their farm in the early 1990s. With their son, they now farm 1,400 acres of certified organic crops and operate Lakeview Organic Grain, a certified organic feed and seed business. Klaas is involved in numerous national organizations and advisory committees including the Organic Farming Research Foundation Board and the Farm Foundation's Soil Renaissance. Organic research is a strong component of their farming operation.
